Keynote Address: "Basics of Evaluation Capacity Building: Skill, Will, and Opportunity" Tom Kelly, Evaluation Manager, Annie E. Casey Foundation

The evaluation field has produced and demonstrated many useful and effective methodologies and approaches. However these methods and approaches often do not live up to their potential for contributing to knowledge building because of limited evaluative capacity in individuals and organizations (and in clients and evaluators). The evaluation and nonprofit capacity building fields have responded by developing useful frameworks and approaches to increasing the understanding, knowledge, and skills required by evaluators, nonprofits, funders, and public agencies. But to have smart evaluation practitioners and even smarter evaluation clients, we need to address the many social, cultural, environmental, and even political factors that both inhibit and incentivize effective evaluative thinking in individuals and organizations and the changes needed in the habits and behaviors of *people* to be good implementers and users of evaluation.

A) Asking Questions That Matter: An Introduction to Program Evaluation
Hallie Preskill, Professor, Claremont Graduate University; 2007 President, American Evaluation Association

In this workshop, we will discuss the steps for designing and implementing an evaluation that produces meaningful, credible, and useful findings. We will specifically focus on identifying critical evaluative questions, understanding a program's underlying theory of change (logic models), linking evaluation questions to data collection methods, and strategies for communicating and reporting processes and findings. Participants will have an opportunity to apply the workshop concepts and tools to an evaluation they might be managing and/or conducting currently or in the near future.

B) Strengthening and Assessing Community Evaluation Capacity
Tom Kelly, Evaluation Manager, Annie E. Casey Foundation, Baltimore, Maryland

To achieve results for communities, nonprofits, policymakers and funders need to make strategic decisions about effective policies and programs based on real-time data and relevant program and policy analyses. In addition, real positive change can only occur and be sustained if well-informed communities hold programs and policies accountable for achieving desired results. The capacity to collect, analyze, interpret, communicate, and use data strategically for decision-making and accountability is critical to obtaining and sustaining successful outcomes and successful programs. Building and sustaining this capacity broadly in the community requires attention and investment beyond traditional individual or organizational training and capacity-building. And measuring and evaluating the progress of community capacity building is equally challenging. This workshop will introduce a framework for community evaluation capacity building and a complementary self-evaluation process which can be applied in different settings.

C) Using Appreciative Inquiry in Evaluation Practice
Hallie Preskill, Professor, Claremont Graduate University; 2007 President, American Evaluation Association

Appreciative Inquiry (AI) is a collaborative process that inquires into, identifies, and further develops the best of "what is" in organizations in order to create more successful experiences, outcomes, and results. An advantage of applying AI to evaluation is its infinite flexibility to adapt to various evaluation contexts, purposes, cultures, and stakeholder groups. In this interactive workshop, participants will learn about the underlying principles and processes of Appreciative Inquiry, as well as how to apply AI to focusing an evaluation, designing and conducting interviews and surveys, and designing evaluation systems.
